



Planning

The Merrywood developer has applied to the Secretary of State for approval to expand an existing easement across Weston Green Common to facilitate increased vehicular access to its planned development. The RA has written to object as this would erode and damage valuable common land and set a dangerous precedent.

The application for an **Aldi (2021/3857)** on the old Guy Salmon site on Portsmouth Road has received 486 letters of objection and 149 in support. A number of statutory

bodies have yet to comment and no committee date has been set.

Café Rouge, Esher (2021/2814). The outline planning application for development on this site has been withdrawn, we wait to see what follows.

The **outline planning application (2021/3258) submitted** for 30 units on the field on the corner of Summer Road and Hampton Court Way is currently under consideration.

Local Plan update

The Local Plan is going before Council on 22 March, moving us onto the next stage of the process for adoption. Once Council has agreed the draft, we will start the Regulation 19 stage of the process, which is the final chance for public comment (six weeks), before we submit the plan for Examination by an Inspector (Regulation 22) and, finally, the Inspectors Report and Adoption (Regulation 24). It has taken a long time to get here, but the evidence gathering stage has been hampered by constantly changing planning regulations and the last two years of pandemic.

However, we believe this may have helped us in the longer term. Sustainability issues have moved much further up the agenda in that time and we believe that the Plan going before Council (which we, as RA councillors, have done a lot to influence in the last year) is much stronger than the Plan we might have seen a few years ago, and it will give us a robust, sustainable and inspirational platform for development in Elmbridge for the next 15 years.

Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) funding round

Applications for the 2022 round for funding from CIL opened on 21 February and stay open until 3 April.

CIL allows EBC to raise funds from development in the borough, which helps pay for the physical infrastructure needed to mitigate the impacts of new development. As part of the process, EBC annually allocates a portion of CIL funds to be spent on local and smaller schemes in the communities where the development took place.

The Local Spending Board is made up of your local Councillors and we decide how the funds are allocated. We want local groups - schools, charities, sports clubs and other non-profit organisations - to review the criteria (available on EBC's CIL web pages) and submit applications for projects that need funding.

Successful projects in the past have included improvements to schools, community facilities, footpath works and countryside access.

Garden Waste - some good news!

The garden waste collection service is still affected and continues to be a frustration for residents. However, the Council has been working hard to restore the service and at the time of writing we understand that on 7 March the service is being resumed in part on a four-weekly basis, rather than two-weekly. The intention is to resume the full service as soon as possible, but this is a step in the right direction.

Just as a reminder, this has nothing to do with saving money or 'cuts'. Garden waste collection is paid for separately by subscribing residents and is a revenue-raising service for EBC. The statutory services for general waste, food and recycling are paid for within your Council Tax.

As the waste service is outsourced, it is the the contractor's allocation of teams that has meant we have no (optional) garden waste collection. The Council's first priority is to continue working closely with Amey, the contractor, to restore the full service as soon as possible.

New candidate for the Hinchley Wood and Weston Green Ward

This May, Nigel Haig Brown will be standing down after eight years as a councillor and we are grateful for his service in representing Weston Green residents. HWRA's Executive has proposed a local resident, James Crawshaw, as the new RA candidate for the ward (subject to formal RA approval). Since the electoral boundary changes in 2016, the new ward straddles TDWGRA and HWRA areas, so both RAs agree on a single candidate, running under the joint banner, Hinchley Wood & Weston Green RAs. James is pictured below planting a tree to mark the Jubilee, in the Memorial Gardens in Hinchley Wood.

Update from Nick Darby, Surrey County Councillor



The council tax for Surrey County Council (SCC) is due to be increased by 4.99%. We spend two thirds of the £1bn budget on Adult and Children's Services. With Covid recovery there is continuing pressure on public finances and we need to be acutely aware of spending every penny wisely.

Locally, work is already under way on Hampton Court Bridge with lane closures. As I write this, the work is likely to take a further three weeks beyond the original projection as the need for extra repair work has been discovered. Looking west to the Moleseys, the replacement of the bridge over the River Mole is due soon but may be delayed as Surrey Highways have recently announced they need planning permission to allow for bridge widening. This bridge is old. The work needs doing so it's the timing and precise details which are the concern. Further along Ember Lane towards Weston Green, I am glad highway safety work is progressing at the S bends.

I am delighted to report that I have been able to use the last of my 'annual allowance' for the current financial year to fund a defibrillator outside the Vera Fletcher Hall, to add to the one recently installed at the Old Cranleighans football pitches near Longmead Road. The more people who are aware of these the better as when they are needed time is of the essence.

Sadly, it looks likely that Surrey County Council will abandon all Local Committees, including the one which serves Elmbridge.

Under new arrangements, any petition from residents for local highway improvements would be dealt with centrally. I fear the loss

of valuable input from experienced Highway Officers, Borough Council Officers and local Councillors as well as a weakening of the democratic process as an unintended consequence of any change.

While in theory it sounds good that County Councillors will each have an annual allocation of £50,000 to put towards local highway works. I am very aware of how little that covers, especially as 'my' allocation needs to cover Long Ditton, Weston Green and Thames Ditton.

I have various local roads in mind for work. With separate funding, I have been promised that proper repairs to Grove Way will be carried out in the new financial year. St Leonards Road remains on my list for separate SCC funding.



Adorning the walls of the ‘computer room’ in the Dittons Library is a historically interesting local work of art. On permanent loan to the community, the Thames Ditton and Weston Green wall hanging depicts local scenes as they were in 1977, the Queen’s Silver Jubilee year.

Forty-five years on, as we move towards the Queen’s historic Platinum Jubilee year, the 64 panels of the locally made wall hanging are still there for all to see – retaining their original colour owing to the high-quality light resistant framing. And it’s free!

Jane Formby and Julia Hickman, two of the four original organisers, have been reflecting on this fantastic local achievement which has left us with such a rich historical community resource.

Julia said: *“It started when I saw an American bicentenary quilt worked by local inhabitants of a small New England town, featured in a magazine. I became enthused to do the same to mark the Queen’s Silver Jubilee in our own community, and luckily, Jane and others were similarly inspired”.*

Jane added: *“The response we received*

from local people was remarkable. Our goal was to produce 25 panels and the enthusiasm was so great that we achieved 64! With an outline plan of the scenes we wanted to cover, we knocked on doors and people young and old got involved.”

To guarantee a quick turnaround and wide community involvement, Julia’s vision was to keep it simple so that everyone could contribute, whatever their sewing experience.

With just a few rough guidelines, people were left to get on with it. This approach resulted in a great composition in a primitive naïve artistic style ranging from the simplicity of what was Tilleys’ Newsagents in the High Street to the intricate embroidery of the bridge to Thames Ditton Island.

The panels tell the story of local activities of that time, some of which are still here, such as the Ajax Sea Scouts, cricket on the green and the A Class Rater boats sailing on the River Thames (unique to this area). Then there are others which no longer exist, such as the Giggs Hill Green annual flower show.


It also depicts local buildings which seem timeless such as St Nicholas church, the fountain and All Saints church in Weston Green. In others they have disappeared, such as the petrol service station in the village, the Harrow in Weston Green Road, and the old Lebanese Cedar tree at the end of Kings Drive.

A great deal of interest and publicity resulted in other communities following suit. Those known to the organisers include Worth Matravers in Dorset and Whiteley Village in Surrey. The wall hanging was featured in Good Housekeeping magazine and there was interest from abroad starting with the magazine *Cent Idees* which marketed the story onwards internationally.

In April 1977 it was presented on the BBC Television programme, *Nationwide*, in their Jubilee feature 'Fit for a Queen'. Jane said: *"It wasn't finished at that point and I remember some frantic last minute pinning together taking place on the studio floor,*

ten minutes before the recording. The host, Michael Barrett, introduced it by saying, 'And now we have something which we feel deserves a special mention ...'"

The four organisers also received an invitation to Windsor Castle from the Queen's Deputy Master of the Household.

Julia described the experience: “We were very excited about the invitation. When we arrived at Windsor Castle, it felt a bit like being invited into the Headmaster’s office when we entered his room. He showed us some interesting Windsor Castle china with frogs on it, and we showed him our designs, leaving him with a poster that he later shared with the Queen”. Jane added: “After our visit we received a letter from him to say that the Queen had ‘commanded’ him to let us know how delighted she was with what we had done, and we also heard that she particularly liked the picture of Concorde, featured flying above the Bay Tree art shop in one of the panels.”

Whether you’re simply curious about your local area, a lover of naïve community art, or interested in local history, your visit to see the wall hanging will be rewarded. The

Thames Ditton, a coastal village, time for action



Thames Ditton - connected to one global ocean?

Our beautiful part of the river Thames has always attracted commentary. It is fascinating to dip into the archives and find out what previous residents were thinking about its health and prospects: for example the *Illustrated Sporting and Dramatic News* of 1892 worries about invasive species (the tawny Balsam) over-running the riverbanks and remarks on “*the mazy curves of the stream, winding slowly round the green outskirts of Hampton Court Park.*”

What seems incongruous to our ears now is the championing of pollution as ‘*progress*’ as reported in 1892 “*To those who knew Thames Ditton some few years ago the river bank must present a wonderful example of progress....now the bank is lined with tall buildings whose taller chimneys puff out volumes of black smoke, while the snort of steam-engines and the ponderous clanging of steam hammers tell of a busier if less picturesque age.*”

Now that we are less excited by billowing black clouds, we tend to look towards how we can preserve and protect, rather than pollute. All great rivers draw you in. It begins with a desire to be near to the water, then to observe it – particularly its

wildlife - then to be on it, and even in it now that wild swimming has started its own revolution. What swiftly follows is a desire to protect and preserve it. Today there are more organisations and campaign groups dedicated to doing exactly this. From ‘plastic picks’ to wildlife conservation they help to answer the question: what can I do to protect this unique and incredible landscape?

I also suggest you look at becoming involved in the big ocean and marine organisations as well. From rising seas to ocean conservation, to a push for a global treaty to end plastic pollution (more on that shortly), we river dwellers face many of the same threats and opportunities.

Many years ago I joined an organisation called Surfers Against Sewage (SAS) based in Cornwall, even though I couldn’t quite work out why! My surfing skills are appalling and despite West Country heritage I’ve lived in and around London for many years. I didn’t even own a wetsuit, although I have one now. But I felt really strongly that I needed to lend my voice to ocean protection.

These days I am a trustee of SAS, which has become one of the main charities dedicated to campaigning for clean seas and water ways. It has the international clout to campaign on everything from climate change to plastic and of course sewage, which remains a serious problem as discharges into rivers increase.

If you cast your mind back to the G7 talks held in Cornwall last year you might remember an image of hundreds of surfers in a ring, holding placards aloft and telling the gathered world leaders that they must act on the climate crisis. It was an image that dominated the front page of newspapers internationally.

How is that type of protest connected to us here? Well, one thing I have learned from fellow water enthusiasts is that London should be thought of as a coastal city, and that should extend to the outer reaches too.

The city itself is linked to the ocean via the tidal River Thames. The tidal limit might be at our neighbour Teddington, but we are still part of that dynamic body of water. Once you start to think of yourself as a 'coastal' area you find yourself more interested in rising sea levels and how the health of rivers affects the health of oceans. We are all part of one great interconnected system.

Interestingly, many oceanographers talk of one 'Ocean', rather than seven seas, preferring to think of the world as a mass of water interrupted by patches of land. That makes us think in terms of Blue Flag Health standards and also starts to address an inequality. Most environmental focus is on landmasses, but in order to preserve a healthy planet we need to work much harder on restoring waterways, including our own river Thames.

Scientists are only now beginning to understand how important rivers are in the

wider battle to protect and conserve oceans. Recent research from the Ocean Clean Up charity theoceancleanup.com showed that more than 1,000 rivers transport Mismanaged Plastic Waste (MPW) as scientists call litter.

So, while we have tended to think of this being an issue involving ten rivers in Africa and Asia, new research shows how rivers such as the Rhine in Europe are also vectors for delivering highly polluting plastic to the ocean. Almost all the plastic waste ever created by humanity is still with us. That means the equivalent weight of one billion elephants of plastic waste made from oil and other chemical additives is held as pollution in 'sinks' in the biosphere.

One of the biggest sinks is the ocean. Sadly, it doesn't sit there inertly. In the ocean the sun and waves break down large plastic into smaller and smaller bits of plastic over time. Arguably this is even more dangerous as these are ingested by living organisms and thus enters the food chain. Many experts consider the plastic crisis in the oceans as the straw that broke the camel's back. It joins climate change and overfishing to put the ocean ecosystem under unprecedented threat.

But we can all play our part in demanding that these threats are taken seriously and that solutions are implemented. These sorts of breakthroughs allow us to refocus our efforts as volunteers and campaigners for clean waterways. More than six million tonnes of waste plastic enters the ocean every year. Part of what we do on organised beach and litter cleans is to intercept that from our rivers.

My informal plastic plogging (yes, it's a real word and a real thing – it's a combination of jogging and the phrase 'plocka upp' which is Swedish for 'to pick up') from my kayak might not seem very relevant or effective (last outing's haul: one Christmas bauble, 11 drinks bottles, a deflated balloon) but I am removing a tiny amount of MPW before it reaches the ocean.

Besides, this is not just litter picking, it's citizen science! Every year the Marine Conservation Society [mscuk.org](http://www.mscuk.org) holds nationwide beach cleans. The important thing about this is not only removing the plastic but also collecting data on plastic pollution as a whole to inform and push policy change at government level. This data has been used by campaign groups to drive changes in policy by presenting hard evidence that cannot be denied.

Closer to home, in 2021 volunteer litter pickers (sorry citizen scientists!) for Thames21.org.uk working at low tide collected 27,000 congealed wet wipes along a 200m stretch of the River Thames. Here and worldwide, congealed wet wipes gathering 'en masse' are changing the shape of the river bed and impacting its ecologies in ways never seen before. To me that's the opposite of progress.





The launch weekend is on Saturday 11 and Sunday 12 June with artists offering an array of activities exclusively for first weekend visitors.




Vicky O'Leary Textiles

Oak Processionary Moth on the march



OPM processing on a tree

Finding Oak Processionary Moth (OPM) in our oak trees is not pleasant, however, it has increased significantly and we cannot ignore it.

The Forestry Commission guidance for Elmbridge on how to manage OPM spread has recently changed, placing a greater onus on the public for vigilance, reporting sightings and managing the problem when it affects trees on our property.

OPM is native to Europe and was accidentally introduced into the UK in 2005 from Europe for a landscaping scheme in London. Initially it was limited to the London area, but it has spread swiftly. It may no longer be possible to eradicate OPM from the UK and the Forestry Commission

and its partners and the public need to work together to minimise its population and spread.

What is the problem?

So, why is OPM a problem? Well, it isn't the moth itself but its caterpillars and their nests. The caterpillars have tiny hairs that contain a substance called thaumetopoein which can cause extreme irritation to human skin. A fully grown caterpillar may have thousands of barbed hairs.

Contact with the hairs can cause skin irritation, rashes and serious allergic reactions. However, you don't even have to touch the caterpillars to be affected as their hairs can be blown in the wind and inhaling them may cause sore throats and breathing difficulty. This isn't just confined to humans, animals are just as susceptible. And we can't rely on the caterpillars to remain in oak trees as the nests can be blown to the ground.

The greatest risk period is May-July, but hairs can remain in old nests which can cause problems at any time of the year.

The advice from the Forestry Commission is clear. If you believe you have been in contact with OPM and show signs of a rash or illness call NHS 111 or see a pharmacist or doctor. If you have a dog, cat, horse, or other animal that you believe may have been in contact with OPM you should contact a vet.

Do not go near the nest or caterpillars, don't let children or animals go near them and don't try to remove the nest or caterpillars yourself.

Impact on our oak trees

The Forestry Commission is very concerned that OPM will become a very serious pest in the countryside if it isn't controlled. The caterpillars feed on healthy oak trees and large populations can strip trees bare of leaves, leaving them vulnerable to other pests and diseases.

The Forestry Commission has produced some simple safety guidelines which can be found on their website

- Don't touch OPM nests or caterpillars
- Keep children away from OPM nests and caterpillars and teach them not to go near them
- Keep pets and other animals away from caterpillars and nests and take the animal to the vet if you believe they have been affected by OPM
- See a pharmacist if you have skin or eye irritation and mention OPM
- Call NHS 111 and go to accident and emergency or your GP if you have a more serious reaction or allergic reaction and suspect OPM
- Don't try to remove nests or caterpillars. This must be done by a professional arborist or pest control

- If you own oak trees inspect them regularly for signs of OPM (see below)
- Tell your neighbours if you suspect your trees are affected by OPM
- Be aware of who is responsible for an infected tree, EBC, Surrey County Council or a private resident, and report the OPM to the relevant body.
- Report an infestation on the Forestry Commission website which enables the spread of OPM to be monitored

Responsibility to take action

Due to the harm to humans, animals, oak trees and the countryside the main focus is to limit the spread of OPM and minimize its population and impact.

To do this, action is required by anyone who owns or manages oak trees. Residents now have an obligation to inspect oak trees on their land and take the appropriate action.

The public also need to be vigilant and report sightings of OPM in public places. In the first instance if you spot OPM when you are out locally try to establish who is the landowner and report the sighting to them and the Forestry Commission:

OPM on Elmbridge Borough Council land

If you see OPM in a tree on land owned by Elmbridge Borough Council, please report it at opm@elmbridge.gov.uk or on 01372 474825 or 01372 474579. EBC are following a risk-assessment approach to each site.

OPM on Surrey County Council trees

If the tree is on a highway it's likely to be the responsibility of Surrey County Council Highways section who can be contacted at: highways@surreycc.gov.uk

OPM on private land

It's the responsibility of the landowner to do regular surveys looking at individual trees and decide the appropriate management needed. Elmbridge Borough Council don't have the resources to visit privately owned areas due to the scale and scope of the problem across the borough.

Before doing a survey it's sensible to familiarise yourself with what each of the stages of OPM lifecycle looks like. You can do this on the Forestry Commission website: www.forestryresearch.gov.uk This site also has a useful manual for owners of oak trees.

Surveys for OPM can be done throughout the year. Spring and winter are particularly useful times. Where there are only one or two oak trees on a site, such as a garden, it's worth checking for symptoms fairly frequently, from the ground, from several angles, and from upstairs windows. Binoculars are a useful aid. OPM caterpillars, or larvae, can be present in all parts of the tree – on the trunk, branches, and leaves, and on the ground.

There are a variety of treatments for OPM which range from chemical treatment, to vacuum removal and pheromone trapping. This will depend on which stage of the OPM lifecycle is to be treated. All these techniques should only be carried out by professionally trained and equipped professional operators. They can be found on the Arboricultural Association website www.trees.org.uk/Find-a-professional

Reporting OPM

If you find OPM or their nests anywhere, you must report it to the Forestry Commission at the Forest Tree alert website www.treelert.forestryresearch.gov.uk where you will need to upload a clear, well lit photograph, but please keep your distance so as not to come into contact with the hairs.

Planning: where are we now?



Since 2010, we have had 11 Ministers of State for Housing, including our local MP, Dominic Raab for a few months in 2018. There have been fewer Secretaries of State, we are now on number six.

Michael Gove is the new Secretary of State and his first task was to rename the department to Levelling Up, Housing and Communities. We are yet to see if he is going to move away from the extremely controversial proposals in the White Paper in 2020. The introduction to the paper stated that *“Britain’s planning system is ‘outdated and ineffective... a relic from the middle of the 20th century that is artificially constraining the country’s potential, preventing homes from being built, businesses from expanding and people moving to where they could get jobs”* Personally I disagree with this statement and believe it is the housing building industry who know exactly how to play the system. They are a powerful lobby in this country.

I wrote an article highlighting my concerns in the Summer 2020 edition of Thames Ditton Today (**see residents-association.com**) I was particularly worried by the requirement for each LPA (Local Planning Authority) to create zones (for growth, for renewal and protected) and design codes.

Once these design codes and zones had been agreed there would be no further involvement from the local community or council and developers would be given the green light to develop what they felt fit.

Many of us responded to the consultation and Graham Cooke (Chairman of

TDWGRA along with other residents’ associations in the borough) lobbied our local MP, Dominic Raab. They have had several meetings with him and he has been left in no doubt about the concerns many residents have.

Rumour has it - there is no actual evidence yet - that the government is preparing a U-turn and the proposed reforms will be significantly watered down. Planning journalists have suggested that the controversial zonal system will be dropped. They have also suggested that the housing targets set nationally for each Local Planning Authority will also be scrapped/reduced. To remind you, we have been set a target of 643 new units per annum for Elmbridge. Given 60% of our borough is Green Belt that is a huge number. It is why we are seeing many applications for high density housing (Merrywood, Hampton Court Trading Estate to name but a few).

We are following developments closely. Whilst the pandemic has understandably diverted attention away from planning reforms we are expecting to hear from the Secretary of State this year so watch this space.

One thing that has caused a great deal of concern in our community is the ‘Prior Approval’ changes that were slipped in as secondary legislation in the summer of 2020 under the noses of many MPs. We have seen this at first hand in Thames Ditton; the owners of A C Court sought Prior Approval for 51 units in the centre of the village and there was nothing as a community we could do to stop it.

An applicant applies for a Prior Approval certificate from the Local Authority which is obligated to grant it unless it fails to meet certain minimum standards relating to issues such as flooding, transport or living standards. I am sure A C Court could be a wonderful asset to the village with well planned residential units, shops, offices, cafés etc. and outside areas for residents to use. However the scheme for 51 flats which was proposed included overly small, cramped flats with little natural light, inadequate air flow and poor design. In this case it was the failure of some of the flats to meet the minimum space standards and inadequate natural light which meant it was refused Prior Approval.

A later Prior Approval application for part of the site (Unit 2) has met the necessary standards so has been given Prior Approval. This is not a planning judgement, simply a tick box exercise. I understand the owners have sold the site on so we will be keeping a very close eye on it.

I have met a number of residents over the years who have got in touch with me when a local application causes concerns. To be honest, 99.9% of the residents I have met in such circumstances have had reasonable concerns, they have not been 'NIMBY,' rather they want to make sure what is built in our area is the best it can be, and who can

argue against that? However, too often, the bar for what is deemed acceptable (e.g. in terms of impact on neighbours, acceptable densities, etc.) is lower in planning terms than it is for those who will be most affected, which is hugely frustrating.

2022 is going to be an 'interesting' year!

I invite you to come along to one of our Sunday services, which are at 10.30am


and include our 'King's Kids' age relevant activities in the adjoining hall. Everyone is warmly welcomed.






